It's been an incredible 35 years...

1979

A small group of people with total funds of £270 formed a charitable trust with the aim of developing a local hospice.



1989

An 11-bed inpatient unit opened at the former Bromhead nurses home on Nettleham Road in Lincoln and could also host a day care service and provide a base for the home care nursing team.

1994

The Trust had five day centres in Gainsborough, Suttonon-Sea, Lincoln (Lea Centre), Boston and Spalding. In 2001, the Lincoln site relocated to Hawthorn Road and was officially opened by Princess Alexandra.



1982

he trust had raised enough money to buy a jursing home on Lindum Terrace in Lincoln, which opened as a four-bed unit ind demand soon grew ind a further two beds opened in 1984.

1990

A welfare service was developed to offer support and guidance to patients, families and carers – in 2016, this has grown to see £8 million of benefits claimed on their behalf.

1994

The first charity shop opened in Lincoln and there are now 26 shops across the county. In November 1996, St Barnabas formed a promotions company, which operates a lottery service throughout the county.



Jenny Freeman The first St Barnabas fundraiser

Jenny played a major role in ensuring that a dream held by a few

people during the late 70's became a reality in 1982.

She launched a fundraising drive, holding coffee mornings, whist drives, jumble sales and a host of other events to raise money.

In an effort to increase income, Jenny opened the first ever St Barnabas Hospice shop and then lead the fundraising effort for 18 years, finally retiring in 1995. It was her determination and stamina that raised the profile of the charity in those early years, bringing in much needed funds to fuel the growth of Lincolnshire's largest hospice.

We identified the need for specialist palliative care in the county and then worked hard to get the idea off the ground. We were a small group who were working on a voluntary basis for something we were all so passionate about. The name St Barnabas was born from a meeting that was held on 11th June – St Barnabas Day. We could have no better patron than St Barnabas – the encourager.

2008

The Inpatient Unit underwent an extensive refurbishment programme and an official opening ceremony was performed by Professor Mike Richards, CBE, National Director for Cancer and End of Life Care, in February 2009.

2011

A consultant in palliative medicine was appointed by the Trust and United Lincolnshire Hospitals NHS Trust, based at the inpatient unit on Nettleham Road and Lincoln County Hospital. A further two consultants have been appointed in Boston and Grantham



2014 St Barnabas pooled its expertise with United Lincolnshire Hospitals NHS Trust and South West Lincolnshire Clinical Commissioning Group to open a ground breaking six-bed hospice within Grantham and District Hospital.

2017 St Barnabas celebrates 35 years of caring for local people.



2010 St Barnabas merged with Gifts Hospice in Grantham to provide Day Therapy services in that area.

Dying Dad says 'thank you' to hospice 'angels'

A hospice patient diagnosed with terminal cancer has given high praise to St Barnabas for helping him to spend quality time at home with his young family



Kevin Shelton, 62, from Anderby Creek near Skegness was given just three to six months to live after being diagnosed with advanced oesophageal cancer before Christmas.

After failed palliative chemotherapy, the married father-of-four was referred to St Barnabas for specialist end of life care.

"I was sceptical at first because I thought hospice care meant that I would have to leave my family to be looked after in a hospice somewhere," says Kevin. "I had no idea there was Hospice at Home nurses who would care for me in my own home.

"My family means everything to me and being at home means that I can be part of making lasting memories that will hopefully live on long after I have gone. My youngest son is only four-years-old and I didn't want to miss a single second of his life now, when I am going to miss out on so much of his future.

The St Barnabas nurses have been a blessing from the very beginning as they have become like friends to my family and me. They immediately helped to get my pain and symptoms under control which means I have a better quality of life and can enjoy the time I have left.





Nothing is ever too much trouble and they are always there to answer any little questions or to soothe any fears you might have. They will do absolutely anything to help and whatever you ask for they will strive to get it for you; they always deliver what they say they will. To me, they are more than just nurses. They are all angels.

Kevin adds: "St Barnabas take the time to really listen to you and when I mentioned that I was struggling to get comfortable or sleep they arranged for a specialist bed to be delivered within 48 hours.

Louise Garwood, Clinical Team Lead for St Barnabas Hospice, said:

"As part of the Hospice at Home team my focus is to bring my expertise and knowledge right into the patient's own home so that they can remain within the home setting. Our priority is to ensure that the patient has a good quality of life and that they are able to enjoy the time they have left with their loved ones. "

St Barnabas Hospice at Home team visit Kevin and his family three or four times a week but can increase their visits when needed.

Kevin said: "It's really reassuring to know that St Barnabas are only ever a phone call away and that we can speak so openly to people who understand fully what we are going through.

"They always include me in all the decisions about my care and that is really important at a time when you feel you are losing control. They have helped to encourage my mobility and independence and subsequently I have set myself little goals about what I would like to achieve, like celebrating my birthday this month and enjoying one last family holiday together."

Supporting you and your family

Our Family Support Team are there to provide free emotional and psychological support to patients, their families and carers, together with support for those who have experienced bereavement.

My husband died and we had been together for a long time, I feel lost.

It is very difficult when someone close to us dies; we experience a range of emotions some of which we do not understand. We can provide weekly support within our bereavement groups that are based around the county. This offers you the opportunity to meet other people who are experiencing similar feelings to yourself. The groups are small and welcoming, and we focus on the practical and emotional effects of a bereavement, which people often feel they cannot talk to their family and friends about.

I don't think I can go to a group yet, it would be too much.

This is sometimes too daunting for some people and that's ok, we can provide individual support with one of our supportive listening volunteers and you may choose to go to the group later on, you can choose to do both for a time, all options are available to you.

My husband was not known to St Barnabas and he died in hospital. Can I still access the bereavement support?

In the Family Support Service we can provide support for anyone within the community who has been bereaved, even those who have not accessed our care and services. The bereavement may have been several years ago but you may still be struggling to come to terms with it.

I have some issues about my relationship with the person that died and I don't know who to talk to.

Sometimes there are difficult circumstances which people feel they may want to talk to someone about, it is sometimes easier to do this with someone who has no emotional connection with you or your past. Our counsellors can provide support for lots of different issues that may arise due to bereavement.



How can I get referred for support?

You can refer yourself by calling our referral number on **0845 055 0708** or you may be referred by your GP, specialist nurses and other health care professionals.



Carer conquers Great Wall of China

Heroic hospice nurse saves the life of radio presenter

St Barnabas Hospice at Home nurse, Josie Vincent, came to the rescue of BBC Radio Lincolnshire's Charlotte Wright who had collapsed while jogging in the uphill area of Lincoln last November.

Josie and Steve Race, another passer-by, gave 42-year-old Charlotte life-saving CPR until an ambulance arrived.

Josie said: "It was just a normal day and I was on my way to visit a patient when I saw Charlotte lying in the street. I stopped immediately to offer my assistance; I could see she was a young woman and I just thought she is too young to die.

"I would hope that if I was ever in the position of needing help that someone would stop for me. I just happened to be in the right place at the right time and I wish Charlotte and her family all the best for the future."

End of Life Care Champions

Congratulations to Sarah Coleman and Kerry Pound, our End of Life Care Facilitators, who came runners up at The National Council for Palliative Care Awards 2017.

They were nominated for the End of Life Care Champions of the Year award that recognises the contribution to end of life care from an individual or team at a local or national level.

St Barnabas Hospice, together with United Lincolnshire Hospitals NHS Trust (ULHT), developed the End of Life Care Facilitator role to ensure patients are given access to the best possible care, in the right place for them by training nursing staff on general wards, to ensure a safe, effective and responsive service. Matron for palliative and end of life care, Kerry Bareham, said: "My role is about demystifying what palliative and end of life care is. There is real anxiety about talking about death and dying and therefore we are not very good at it.

"This is about enabling patients and their families to be involved and understand their plans of care and giving them access to timely support in the community and working with the third sector too."

Grandmother vows to repay hospice kindness

Jean Marshall, 77, from Louth volunteers at our bookshop on Eastgate and has taken part in many of our events including a sponsored dog walk and our annual Light Up a Life celebration.

Her husband Gordon, 75, was supported by the St Barnabas Hospice at Home team for seven months after he was diagnosed with an aggressive form of cancer that spread throughout his spine and into his liver.

"By the time Gordon was diagnosed he was in severe pain and was no longer able to get about without help," says Jean. "Still, I didn't have any worries about looking after Gordon at home because I assumed it would be like any other time he had been unwell. Except it wasn't and it soon became apparent that we were out of our depth.

"St Barnabas was recommended to me and after making a phone call they arrived the very next day. It was a real relief when they turned up and I'll always remember one of the first things they said to me was 'you haven't got to worry, we'll look after him now' and they absolutely did.

"They immediately set about bathing and changing him and ensured that we had everything we needed, nothing was ever too much trouble."

St Barnabas Hospice at Home team are there to help manage the medical needs of a patient with a life-limiting illness but also to offer a listening ear, practical advice and support; or even sometimes a comforting arm round the shoulder.

Jean said:

The care was simply marvellous and I welcomed their daily visits, they became more like friends than nurses. They always had time for you and took the time to look after me as well as Gordon.

"Since Gordon has died this care has continued and they will often phone or pop-in to see how I am. They even attended Gordon's funeral which I found to be a real comfort, after all they were faces I had come to know well.

"I feel really lucky to have had the support of St Barnabas and if it wasn't for them

Gordon would have never been able to return home. I honestly don't know how I would have coped without them, their support was truly invaluable."

Jean and Gordon were happily married for 53 years and had three daughters and five grandchildren. During the final month of Gordon's life their daughters Julie, Linda and Heather moved in to help support their mum.

Linda Spence, 50, said: "The St Barnabas team delivered top quality care and compassion enabling our dad to remain in the comfort of his own home with as little fear as possible.

"Their care was over and above anything we could have asked for and for that we are forever grateful. Surviving this difficult time would have been made so much more difficult without them." Jean concludes: "Keeping busy helps me through the grief and provides me with the opportunity to give something back to try and repay them for all they did for my family and me. I'd do anything to help them so that they are able to continue to offer their care and support to others who need it."

Tour de Sands

Jerry Watson is fundraising to honour a truly special person, his wife Sandra, who sadly died from cancer on 17th March 2016.



Having been initially diagnosed with cervical cancer in 2002, Sandra had the lymph nodes in her groin

removed, which caused her legs to swell and become uncomfortable. Exercise would ease her symptoms and she began cycling, slowly building up her strength to cycle 20 – 25 miles per day.

Unfortunately, Sandra's cancer returned to her lung in 2012, so she got back on her bike and began to build up her fitness and lung capacity.

November 2015 brought more devastating news that Sandra had a secondary cancer in her brain, which was surgically removed. After a 2016 holiday to New Zealand, another scan showed the tumour had spread to her spinal cord, which was untreatable.

St Barnabas enabled Sandra to have her final wish - to die at home surrounded by friends and family. She died just 10 days after returning home from New Zealand.

Jerry has established the Tour de Sands charity in Sandra's honour with three main aims:

1) To improve the quality of life for those with Lymphedema and terminal, debilitating illness by improving access to information and opportunity.

- To support efforts by professional hospices to improve the quality final days and of death, especially at home.
- 3) To introduce more people to the lifeaffirming and self-improving experience of long distance cycling.

Jerry now plans to cycle 1,600 miles with friends from his home in Easton on the Hill (Stamford) to their holiday home in Elviria (near Marbella) over the course of a month. This will be known as the E2E Ride. He will be taking Sandra's bike along for the ride, which will have a different rider each day. It will be the only bike which completes the entire route.

Love is in the air

Love birds, David and Marie Pattison have collectively racked up around 9,600 working days at St Barnabas – that's 40 years hard work!



Marie interviewed as an Office Junior aged 16, and began her role at St Barnabas in 1984 at the Norman House office on Steep Hill. Shortly afterwards, David's mum (who worked in a St Barnabas shop) told him about a volunteering opportunity as a Van Driver there.

David decided to ask Marie out for a drink, so they went to a pub in Bracebridge Heath on their first date.

David said: "It was definitely love at first sight. Marie was hard working and you could tell she was the sort of woman who would enjoy looking after me."

One thing led to another, and six months down the line David decided that Marie was the lady he wanted to spend the rest of his life with. He proposed at the Carpenters Arms in Fiskerton after asking Marie's dad for permission, but didn't go down on one knee!

They got married two years later on 11th June 1988, aged 21 and 22. Funnily enough, St Barnabas also celebrates its anniversary on this date! Marie and David now have a 25 year old daughter called Laura, a five year old grandchild called Owen, and a cat called Annie.

When asked what the secret to a happy marriage is, Marie said: "We're content in each other's company and like to make sure we have enough space to do our own thing."

Now aged 50 and 51, Marie and David have seen dramatic changes at St Barnabas since they first began working here.

Marie said: "It has grown beyond recognition – there only used to be three people in my office and we did all the admin for the entire company.

"I once had the pleasure of meeting Prince William, who was absolutely lovely. He seemed very interested in the work the Hospice did, and spent some time with a couple of children whose mother had died at the Hospice."

David added: I also met Richard Todd, who was an actor in The Dam Busters. He looked exactly the same as he did on screen, although his car was a bit of an old banger!"

Both Marie and David agree that St Barnabas Hospice has played an integral part in their lives all the way from bringing them both together, to the present day. In particular, St Barnabas has cared for Marie's grandmother, David's step-father and also David's sister.

Lifeline offered to patients in East Lindsey

A hospice patient living with a rare progressive disease has given her praise to St Barnabas in Louth, with whom she credits being her saviour.

Lynn Peace was just 18 years old when she began to notice symptoms of what was eventually diagnosed as Hereditary Spastic Paraplegia.

The disease causes stiffness and contraction in the lower limbs, as a result of damage or dysfunction of the nerves.

Lynn, 37, from Mumby explained how she didn't think the hospice would be able to help someone with her condition but how our support became invaluable.

Lynn said: "The nurses there are very understanding and they really take the

St Barnabas has been my lifeline and I now have a very different outlook on life. I am able to see the good once again." time to listen to you and have helped to manage my pain and symptoms. With their guidance, my confidence has grown and for the first time I am able to express how I truly feel.

"Attending Day Therapy has also opened up opportunities to meet

people in a similar situation to my own, which has been a great relief. We are able to share our experiences and it is a great comfort to realise you are not on your own."

The flagship day hospice, run by Lincolnshire's St Barnabas Hospice, from the building leased to them by Louth & District Hospice has propelled palliative care into a new era by providing and developing a whole range of care services for the local community from the Grimsby Road site.

Lynn visits St Barnabas twice a week and during her time there she has benefited from physiotherapy, tai chi and acupuncture.

Lynn concludes: "Hospice care has been an eye opener and really is more than I ever could have imagined. At St Barnabas I feel like I am part of a family and I even think of it as my second home. It is a beautiful building with glorious gardens that I look forward to visiting each and every week."

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Dreams come true

A young hospice patient has been treated to "the best day of his life"- his childhood dream of a behind the scenes tour of RAF Coningsby.

Avid aeroplane fan Andrew has been attending our St Barnabas Day Therapy Centre in Lincoln for the past 14 months having been diagnosed with end stage renal failure at the age of 22. He will need dialysis indefinitely or until he is strong enough to undergo a kidney transplant. A recently discovered heart condition means surgery has been delayed.

"I am just waiting and hoping that one day my heart will be strong enough to allow me to have the transplant and that I will be able to get some normality back to my life," says Andrew. "Life on dialysis has had a far greater impact on my life than I ever could have imagined.

"It touches every aspect of your life from preventing you from eating the foods you enjoy to taking part in the sports you once loved. Life becomes about hospital appointments, treatments and medications and your days become long and drawn out. It's hard to remain positive and I am not ashamed to admit that I was becoming depressed.

"The nurses at St Barnabas understood how I was feeling and they went above and beyond their call of duty to organise a once in a lifetime visit to RAF Coningsby."

After hearing about Andrew's love of planes, hospice staff wanted to help him fulfil his ambitions and contacted the Willow Foundation, a national charity working with seriously ill young adults to fulfil uplifting and unforgettable special days.

Andrew said: "I couldn't believe it when I got the call to say the day had been arranged, I couldn't stop smiling. Best of all, it was lovely to have something to look forward to and for the first time in a long time, hospital visits weren't the dominating factor in my life.

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"The day was all I could have hoped for and more and it was lovely to be able to share the experience with my foster Dad and brothers. We all dressed smartly in our suits and we were treated to a tour of the Lancaster Lounge, Battle of Britain Hangar and got to ride in the flight simulator.

"The absolute highlight has to be the moment I was allowed to sit in a working Lancaster and a Typhoon, it was like a dream come true. The experience was one of the best days of my life and something that my family and I will always cherish."

Sarah Fitter, Higher Lever Staff Nurse for St Barnabas Hospice, said:

"After taking the time to get to get to Know Andrew I soon realised that he was feeling fed-up with the focus of his life being around hospital visits and that this was starting to have a real impact on his wellbeing. "At St Barnabas we are blessed with time to really find out what a person needs in order to gain an improved quality of life or sense of wellbeing and purpose."

Andrew will continue to access St Barnabas Day Therapy services to manage his symptoms as and when the support is needed.

Andrew adds: "The wonderful thing about the Hospice is it provides an oasis of calm and relaxation and they help you to live as fully as you are able. They looked after me as a whole person and didn't just treat the medical side of things.

They took the time to understand what was important to me and the special visit to RAF Coningsby had a profound effect on my overall wellbeing. It has had a more far reaching effect than any medical intervention ever has.

Making money one less worry

Living with a life-limiting illness, or caring for someone who is, can lead to serious financial problems. Our Welfare Services Team can help you understand what financial help is available.

They can provide practical support with:

- Finding out what you're entitled to
- Applying for benefits and grants such as completing forms, making phone calls or writing letters
- Accessing help with health costs, such as travel to hospital
- Applying for transport concessions, such as a disabled parking badge
- Advising on benefits decisions
- Accessing benefits following a bereavement and towards funeral costs

It's a good idea to speak to our Welfare Services Team who will be able to help you understand your options. A member of the team can help you claim benefits and other income you are entitled to, this can be done either by telephone, a home visit or at one of the Day Hospices.

If appropriate, a member of the team can make the claim for benefits on behalf of the individual, including completing the paperwork.
