

## Fear of the unknown

In December 2011, Irene Larder, 69 died from pancreatic cancer at our hospice on Nettleham Road in Lincoln. Since then her daughters have worked tirelessly to raise money for the hospice and Pancreatic Cancer UK in their mother's memory.

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Diane Bell, 44, and her sister Sharon Yell, 41, spent a year planning a charity ball which was held at Kenwick Park Hotel in October 2014. Over 160 people turned out for the black tie event in tribute to Irene's brave battle.

Diane and Sharon share with us their initial fears of the hospice and why they choose to support us.

Diane said: "We were keen to organise the ball because we wanted to give something back for all the wonderful care we had received as a family.

"Mum spent three weeks in the hospice and the care she received was second to none and best of all they kept her dignity throughout." The black tie event included raffles, music, a three course meal and also an auction with donated prizes such as an afternoon at a Premier League football ground, motor racing hospitality and pamper sessions.

Diane's employers, TSB, are further boosting the total amount raised through their Match Giving initiative.

Sharon said: "This is the first time we have ever planned an event and we were lucky to have the help of our family and friends who gave up their time to support us. They understood how important it was for us to be able to give something back. "If I'm completely honest, in the beginning I didn't want Mum to come to St Barnabas Lincolnshire Hospice because I was frightened of what lay behind those doors.

"I soon realised there was no reason to be frightened and the staff there instantly put us all at ease. We soon came to feel very safe at the hospice and very cared for.

"The nurses there were simply wonderful and we started to think of them as our friends. They understood the complex emotions we were experiencing and encouraged us to talk about how we were feeling. They really empathised with what we were going through." \*\* That was the unique thing about St Barnabas Lincolnshire Hospice, they didn't just look after Mum, they looked after the whole family. \*\*

Irene was admitted into the hospice in November 2011 after being diagnosed with terminal pancreatic cancer in October 2011.

Diane said: "The onset of the disease was very sudden and Mum deteriorated extremely quickly. It was hard to watch but the doctors at the hospice took the time to explain to us what was happening and what to expect as Mum's condition worsened.

"Most importantly they were always very honest with us; we knew exactly what was happening at all times."

Irene had celebrated her 69th birthday in the hospice before sadly dying on 6th December 2011.

Diane said: "There is nothing quite like St Barnabas Lincolnshire Hospice. Nothing was ever too much trouble and they cared for Mum with such unbridled depths of compassion.

"For that reason alone we will always support them in any of our fundraising efforts. We just want be able to repay them for their care and kindness."



Our dedicated workforce at our inpatient facilities work tirelessly to ensure that our patients and their families receive the care and support they need. They also recognise the importance of creating special moments and memories for their loved ones to cherish.

On Christmas Day our patients began the day with a specially made breakfast complete with a mini bottle of fizz, box of chocolates and a lovingly wrapped Christmas present. We also ensured that any children visiting the hospice would have a present waiting for them under the hospice Christmas tree.

It is only with the generosity of our local community that we are able to support our patients in creating precious memories.

#### You made a difference

In November we launched an appeal on Facebook for unopened travel size toiletries and light-weight fleece blankets for our patients at our inpatient facilities.



The toiletries are used by our patients and our nurses to provide their personal care and the blankets were for our patients who are sadly too emaciated for regular blankets.

The response we had from our supporters was unparalleled and we were simply overwhelmed by the show of support.

Hundreds of donations were received daily from across the county and allowed us to give our patients the added quality of care they deserve.

# Time we never thought we'd have

Chris Brooker, 50, relives how he broke the saddest news of all to the woman he loved. His wife Alie was dying from secondary bone cancer and she had only hours or at best days left to live.

In this very personal account, Chris describes how transferring Alie to the hospice meant they were able to share more precious moments together.

Chris said: "Alie's diagnosis came completely out of the blue. It was New Year's Eve 2013 and Alie was in the hospital to have her arm looked at following an incident involving her power steering belt snapping on her car. An x-ray soon revealed that Alie had broken her humerus bone plus she had fractures to her ribs and hip area.

"These injuries were inconsistent with Alie's accident which was one with no trauma attached to it. It was then that the doctors revealed their suspicions: Alie could have cancer.

In a matter of days our worst fears were confirmed by the results of a biopsy.

"It was then that Alie was diagnosed with secondary bone cancer. I couldn't believe what I was hearing. Alie had always been in good health and apart from the pain in her arm there hadn't been any symptoms." Alie and Chris had been together for 33 years and married for 26. They were childhood sweethearts who met at 15 and went on to have four children together.

"Up to this point I hadn't told our children about the cancer because Alie and I had wanted to sit down with them and tell them together at home, alongside the rest of the family. Alie was put on a course of radiotherapy and suffered severe side effects that made her extremely unwell and further weakened her already brittle bones.

"With Alie too poorly to return home I took the decision to tell our children myself. It was one of the hardest things I have ever had to do, but I had to tell them. It just wasn't fair to leave them in the dark for one day longer."

Alie's health continued to deteriorate and after only three weeks in the hospital Chris was given the news he had been dreading. "The doctor told me Alie's cancer was far more aggressive than they had first thought. Her body was struggling under the strain of the cancer and the treatment. It was then they delivered the worst news of all; Alie had only hours or at best days left to live.

44 I was utterly shocked. The wind was completely knocked out of me. It was as though I had found myself trapped in a nightmare that I couldn't wake up from. They hadn't told Alie yet and even though I knew it would be difficult, she had to hear the news from me. After all Alie was my wife, the love of my life, my best friend and my soul mate.

"Alie reacted incredibly well to the news, she was such a strong character and that was apparent now more than ever. I was awestruck by her bravery and how she was managing to face this devastating news head on."

Chris was familiar with our services and Alie was soon admitted into the care of our hospice on Nettleham Road in Lincoln.

Chris said: "After only a short while at St Barnabas Alie's condition improved considerably and her spirits lifted. I accredit this to the expert care she was receiving from the specialist team who are experienced enough to know how to look after someone at the end of their life.

"The team of staff and volunteers demonstrated such sincere compassion and even set up a bed in Alie's room for me because they understood that I couldn't be away from her for a single second. "St Barnabas always cared for Alie with the utmost dignity and respect. We always felt like Alie was a priority and nothing was ever too much trouble. The hospice team were always sensitive to how the family were feeling and they were always there to support each and every one of us.

"Alie was keen to have certain things in order with regard to her funeral and where her final resting place would be. I know she was comforted somewhat by having these plans in place. She didn't want to be involved with the rest of her funeral arrangements but knew we would do her proud and everybody did."

Alie Brooker died in the hospice on 17th February aged 47.

Chris said: "The end came quite quickly for Alie. She became very weak and deteriorated suddenly. I called our children and family who rushed to be by her bedside and they were able to see her one final time.

"When Alie took her final breath, it was just me and her alone; it was a very private and very painful moment. But its how she wanted it, how we both wanted it.

46 I think it is a common misconception that people go to the hospice to die. Yes Alie died in the hospice but because of them we were able to share four more precious weeks together. It was time we never thought we'd have. 99

## The **ultimate battle**

Lincoln wrestling champion, Hayden Loeve, 31 has raised £2,135 at a charity event he organised in memory of his mum.

Hayden, better known as 'Dutch' to his wrestling fans, began planning the Body Slam to Cancer event the day after losing his mum, Dee Mansell to a four-year cancer battle.

The Lincoln Fight Factory Heavyweight Champion arranged the fundraising event at Yarborough Leisure Centre on 10th October 2014, challenging wrestlers from across the country to compete for the Dee Mansell Charity Memorial Cup.

Dee, 54, was diagnosed with an aggressive form of breast cancer in 2010 and despite being given the all clear the cancer returned. This time she had found a cancerous lump on her neck which had spread into her lungs.

Hayden said: "Mum had always wanted to see me fight in the ring but sadly due to her illness she never got the chance. We had planned for her and a friend to come and watch but she was rushed into hospital where she died three days later.

"We had often spoken about putting on a show for charity as Mum was desperate to give something back to the people who had helped her through her darkest times. That's why, alongside my wife and brothers, I threw myself into organising this event. I was determined to achieve Mum's goals for her.

"Part of her enjoying the time she had left was the time she spent at St Barnabas Lincolnshire Hospice in Gainsborough. When the word 'hospice' was first mentioned it set alarm bells ringing in my head. I thought it would be like a care home, all doom and gloom and depressing.

"I couldn't have been more wrong. The place was warm and welcoming and the staff and volunteers went the extra mile to look after the entire family. It was a relief to know that Mum was getting the help she needed and that we would be involved in her care."

Dee regularly attended our Day Therapy Centre in Gainsborough where she accessed complementary therapies, such as Indian Head Massage, Reiki and relaxation techniques.

Hayden said: "I remember speaking to Mum after she'd had a massage and she told me how good it had made her feel. She said she felt completely relaxed and at ease, which was a welcome relief from the side effects she was experiencing from her medication. <sup>55</sup> Day Therapy also provided Mum with crucial social support. She had the opportunity to make new friends and speak to people in a similar situation to her own. St Barnabas played a crucial role in Mum's journey right until the end and for that reason alone we were compelled to give something back. 99

"We are already in talks with St Barnabas for next year's Body Slam to Cancer which we hope will be even bigger and better. The show helped us to grieve as a family and putting our efforts into something positive made us feel good again.

"I hope that we can create a lasting legacy to Mum. The strong, courageous and passionate woman who just wanted to give something back."

## Grantham Hospice in the Hospital: eight months on

In September last year we made UK history when we opened the first ever hospice in the hospital at Grantham. The purpose built unit has already cared for more than 70 patients from the south of the county.

Last month Adrian Curtis from The Grantham Target spoke with Linda Lovell about how the new unit helped to care for her mother.

Linda Lovell didn't know the "hospice in a hospital", the first of its kind in the UK, even existed but following the care her mum Mary Parker received, she is now urging more Grantham families to make use of its facilities.

St Barnabas Lincolnshire Hospice, United Lincolnshire Hospitals NHS Trust and Lincolnshire South West Clinical Commissioning Group, pooled their expertise in a unique partnership that has made history.

It is the first hospice to be opened within a hospital anywhere in the UK and is staffed by a team who provide specialist end-of-life care.

Mrs Lovell, whose mum was in the hospice from October 31 until her death on November 6, said:

"My mum was moved into the hospice from the hospital a week before she died, the staff were just amazing. It made her final week so much better and for my sister and I.



66 "We could spend all day with her and I even spent one night with her. It was great for my sister and I. The staff are so caring and wonderful. The place is very calming and the rooms are like hotel rooms. ??

"It is such a beautiful and calm place. Everything is lovely. I didn't even know it existed. When they said they were going to move my mum down to the hospice, I wondered what they were talking about.

"I didn't know it was there at all. I think it is an amazing thing to do and made a terrific difference to us in terms of travelling.

"The facilities for relatives who want to stay over are excellent. My mum was 95 and a real fighter. She had not been well for many years.

"She had stayed in her own home with carers until she went into hospital. I cannot speak highly enough of the place and the staff. People should have no worries about anybody going in there."

The unit has broken new ground in healthcare design and layout, triggering interest from hospices across the UK in the way it aims to transform the patient experience.

The unit will save family and friends a 60-mile round journey to what was the charity's only existing inpatient unit in Lincoln.



It was opened after figures revealed that South West Lincolnshire has one of the fastest-growing populations in the UK, with GPs reporting an increase in the number of their patients suffering from cancer, heart and lung disease and dementia.

Sarah-Jane Mills, chief executive of St Barnabas Hospice, said:

\*\* The 'hospice within the hospital' heralded the start of a new era for endof-life care not just here in Lincolnshire but for the rest of the UK too.

"It is about widening local access to hospice services - offering all those living in the community with lifelimiting illnesses a far wider choice of how and where they would like to receive their care." Go online at www.granthamtarget.co.uk for all the latest news in Grantham.




It was a real honour that so many people chose to remember their loved ones at our Light Up a Life celebrations and it was bittersweet to see so many torches burning brightly.




#### It's time to get messy!

The book chronicles a catalogue of mystical and uncanny events which occurred after the death of his wife Yvonne.


