

## **Terms and Conditions for St Barnabas Tree-Cycle 2025**

### **Purpose**

Tree-cycle is a fundraising initiative by St Barnabas Hospice designed to support essential hospice care services in your local Lincolnshire communities.

By making a voluntary donation for us to collect your Christmas tree(s), you'll be directly contributing to the funding of these vital services.

### **Donation Amount**

We suggest a donation of £19.93 per tree for collection, which enables us to provide one hour of care for a patient in their own home.

Where your voluntary donation falls below the above, we reserve the right to contact you to request an additional payment if collecting your tree would result in us incurring extra costs. This extra payment will not be eligible for Gift Aid.

### **Gift Aid**

Adding Gift Aid allows us to claim an extra 25p for every £1 you donate. By way of example, a £20 donation would result in an additional £5 for St Barnabas Hospice, at no extra cost to you. A Gift Aid form will be included during the booking process so please do check your eligibility before adding Gift Aid to your donation.

### **Data Use**

We need to input your data into a route planning software system provided by an external supplier in order to plan our drivers' routes and facilitate the collections. By providing your details, you consent to this use of your information for the purpose of ensuring an efficient and timely collection process.

### **Right to Cancel Collection**

We may need to cancel your tree collection due to unforeseen financial, logistical or operational issues. In such cases, we will contact you to discuss alternative arrangements or to process a refund.

### **Alternative Recycling Options**

We recognise that this fundraising approach may not suit everyone's needs. If you would like an alternative option, please check with your local council to see if they offer a tree recycling service.
